

- Top two age groups: 27-31 (22%), 17-21 (20%)


# Shooting Victims Trends By Week


# Robbery

Robbery Sub Type	2/1/21 -3/1/21	YTD	YTD Percent Change
Carjacking	27	71	+209%
Robbery of Business	13	23	+ 44%
Overall Robbery	113	290	+ 35%

- Started tracking “carjacking” intentionally as a subset of Robbery in September of 2020.
- 67% of the robbery incidents have occurred in the Third and Fifth Precincts. Similarly, those precincts are were 70% of the carjacking incidents have occurred.
- Business Robbery Trends: Several incidents occurring in the far southside of the city, as well as downtown commercial corridors.

# Property Crime Snapshot

# Burglary

Type of Burglary	2020	2021	Percent Change
Dwelling	221	199	-10.0%
Business	114	160	+40.4%
Subset – Burglaries with vehicle stolen	13	20	+53.8 %

- Overall, burglary is at an 5.7% increase for 2021 which combines the offense codes of “Burglary of a Business” and “Burglary of a Dwelling”
- Burglaries of Businesses have driven this increase the most with a 40% increase
  - This increase mostly seems to be targeting restaurants and common areas of apartment buildings such as storage areas and garages
- Item of note: the MO of vehicles being stolen during the course of a burglary is up more than 50% in 2021, most often stolen during occupied home burglaries overnight.

# Theft from Motor Vehicles

## 1/1 – 2/15

Type of Crime	2020	2021	Percent Change
Catalytic Converter Thefts	204	370	+81.4%
Theft of License Plates	76	51	-32.9%
Theft from Vehicles	592	394	-33.4%

- Price of precious metals found inside of catalytic converters continues to rise
- Since 1/1/2020, there have been 20 vehicles victimized 2 or more times through 2/15/2021
- Most common Makes and Models Targeted
  - Toyota Prius
  - Honda CRV
  - Honda Element
- Theft of license plates typically decrease as we see increases of auto thefts, especially in the winter months

# Auto Theft

- 769 Auto thefts this year vs 759 ytd in 2020, up slightly
- Most notable is the prevalence of vehicles stolen while left running unattended
  - At least 75% of Vehicles stolen this year have been left running
  - This trend is primarily driven by victims “warming” vehicles in front of their residence and delivery drivers leaving vehicles running while picking up or dropping off orders

# Helicopter Usage

- Pilots act as close aerial support for officers actively engaged in a planned detail or situation that is unfolding.
- Use of aircraft provides a level of situational awareness that is not attainable by officers on the ground or actively involved in the detail or incident.
- The Minnesota State Patrol continues to be a valued partner and their aviation unit acts as a life line of sorts for officers during these details.
- Use of the helicopter helps mitigate risk to the general public during police operations because of their specific vantage point and technology available when using aircraft.
- Approval for the use of the helicopter is on a case by case basis, and dependent upon the availability of the aerial assets.

# Office of Violence Prevention

# Project LIFE (Group Violence Intervention/GVI)

- An evidence-based approach relying on partnership between community members, social service providers, and law enforcement acting together to address the actions of gangs/groups most responsible for driving serious violence.
- Since 2017, Project LIFE has served 356 clients.
- In 2020, Project LIFE completed more client intakes than in any previous year.
- Over the past few months, City staff, community partners, and jurisdictional partners have been working to establish a formal youth-focused GVI Jr. model. The jurisdictional partners continue to work on data sharing toward the goal of creating a pathway allowing juvenile probation to make services available to the young people they're serving.
- In the meantime, we are serving a small number of young people who have come through community/self-referrals.

# Next Step

- Partnership with Hennepin Healthcare and North Memorial to provide services and support for people who are in the hospital because they were the victim of a gunshot, stabbing, or other violent assault injury.
- Prior to 2020, services were limited to participants 28 or younger for program capacity reasons. In 2020, that upper age limit was eliminated.
- In the fall of 2020, OVP staff, Next Step leadership, and staff and leadership from Abbott Northwestern began exploring an expansion of Next Step services to Abbott Northwestern hospital.
- With funding included for expansion in the 2021 City budget, exploration has now transitioned to planning. A cross-departmental team of hospital staff, the Next Step Program Manager, and the OVP manager has begun mapping out implementation of services at Abbott Northwestern. Anticipated rollout is Quarter 2 of 2021.

# Minneapolis Strategic Outreach Initiative

- One-time funding was allocated for a pilot in 2020. Given that it was one-time funding, the pilot was intentionally limited in scope, reach, and duration. But, it provided a visible violence prevention response in communities. And, it functioned as an important part of the planning process by providing an opportunity to gather information as part of the ongoing work of developing longer-term, broader implementation.
- The Office of Violence Prevention has been working with Cure Violence Global to receive technical assistance on implementation planning.
- In 2021, a competitive Request for Proposals (RFP) process will be used to determine eligible partner agencies capable of supporting teams of Violence Interrupters.
- The RFP is live now and closes on March 11, 2021. We anticipate funded agencies' work will start in May and community rollout of teams will start in June.
- In the meantime, some elements of the existing community partnerships that provided services during the pilot phase will be available to serve the community.
