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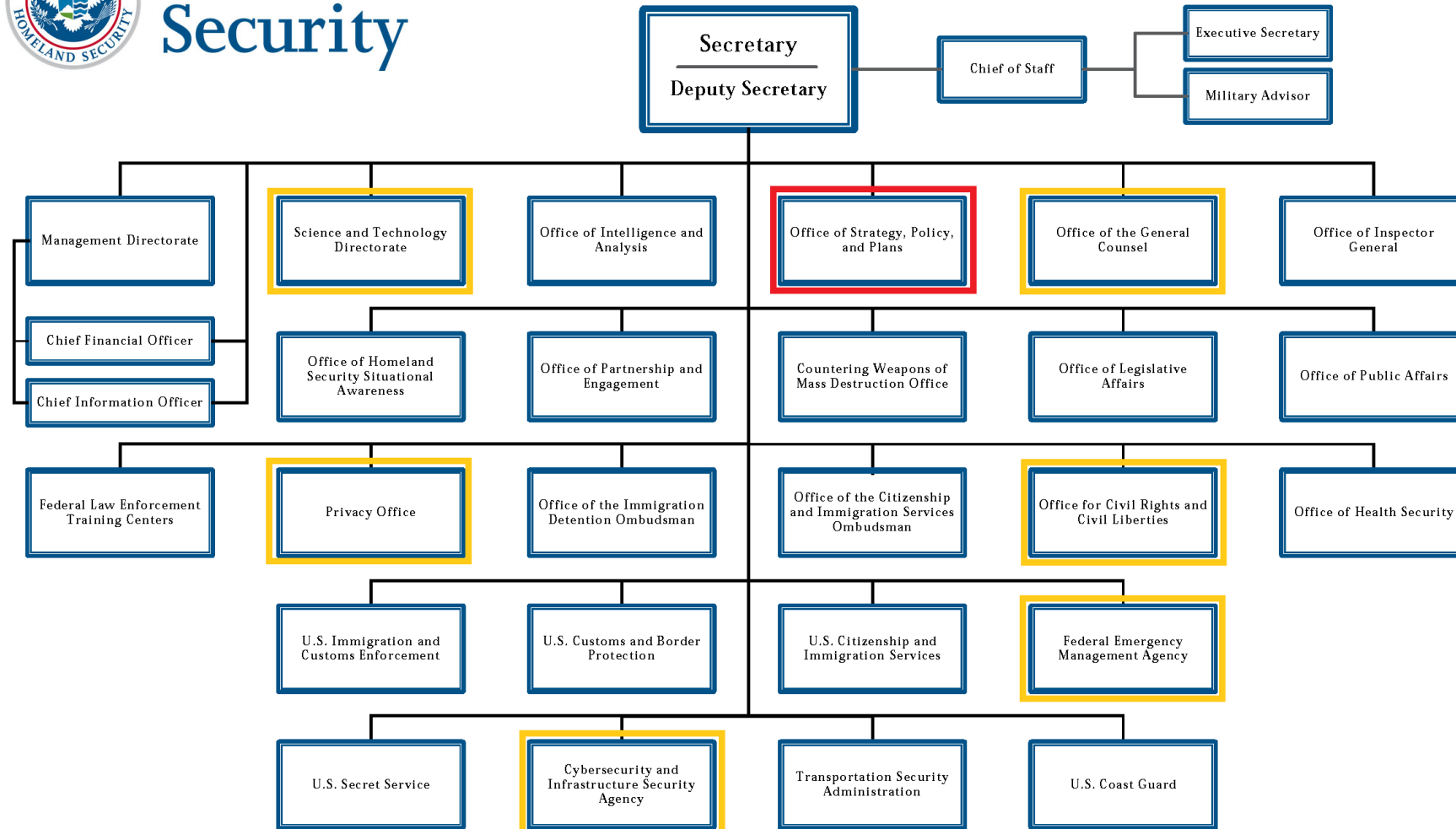

- Federal operations



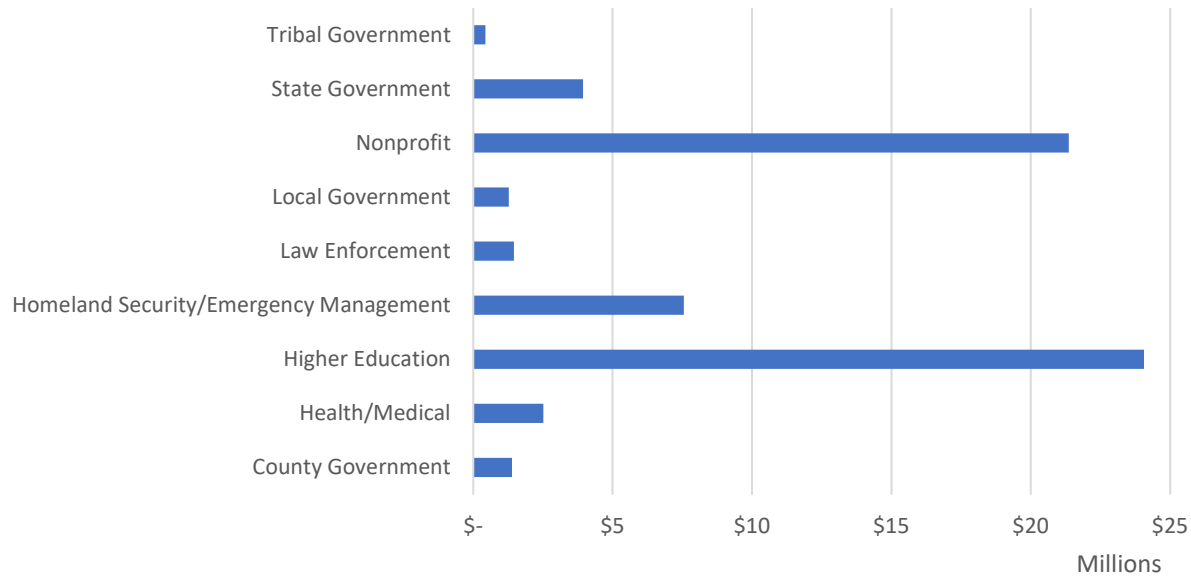
TVTP Grant – What it is

- Informed by public health
- Funding directly to state, local, tribal, and territorial governments; nonprofits; higher education institutions
- Address all forms of targeted violence
 - Racially or ethnically motivated violent extremists, including white supremacists
 - Anti-government, including militia
 - Lone offenders

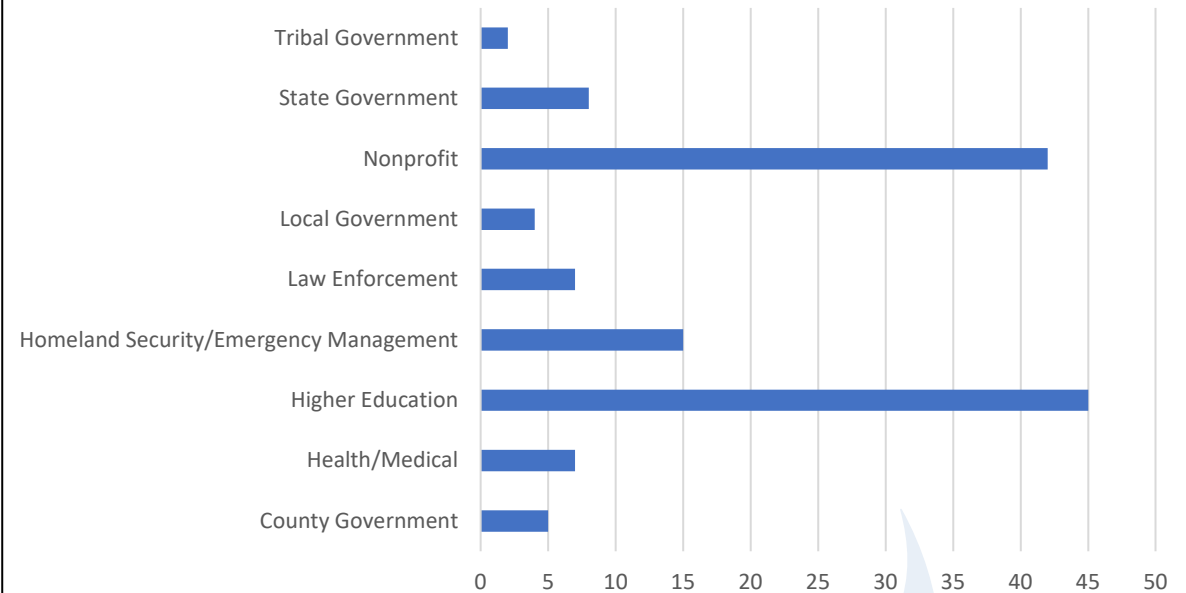


TVTP Grant Recipients

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Connection to *Minneapolis 2040*


Minneapolis policies supporting social connectedness, safety, and health	
Cultural districts (Policy 34)	Strengthen neighborhoods by prioritizing and accelerating economic development, public transit, and affordable housing policies, practices, and resources to protect the racial diversity and uplift the cultural identity of the city's areas where a significant portion of the population is comprised of people of color, Indigenous people, and/or immigrant communities.
Environmental Justice and Green Zones (Policy 61)	Establish environmental justice frameworks for policy, resources and regulation.
Social connectedness (Policy 81)	Expand and promote opportunities for all residents to connect socially and participate fully in the vitality of their community.
Public safety (Policy 84)	Prioritize collaborative, multisector, community-inclusive approaches to ensuring safety for all members of our community.
Access to health, social, and emergency services (Policy 85)	Expand equitable access to health, social, emergency preparedness, and emergency response services.
Place-based Neighborhood Engagement (Policy 100)	Strengthen the City's robust neighborhood-based community engagement system to ensure that it effectively and equitably builds people's capacity to organize to improve their neighborhoods.

Program Goals

Objective: Use a public health approach to build community capacity of awareness, knowledge, self-efficacy, and protective factors of violent extremism.

Goal 1: Prevent future acts of violent extremism through a community co-created violent extremism **awareness campaign** designed to build trust with the community and develop local partners' understanding of the issues through the community's eyes using intentional civic engagement designed to surface needs and concerns around specific threats.

Goal 2: Engage the community as clear partners in prevention by co-creating and jointly hosting community-specific **bystander/upstander training**.



Program Delivery

Methods

- Resilience Hubs (in development)
- Community organizations

Audiences

- Community members and residents
- Law enforcement
- Fire & EMS
- Emergency management



Program Activities

Develop and conduct customized Community Awareness Briefings, including context for training by including incidents that have impacted specific communities

With small planning group including at least one member from major responder partners, conduct training in trauma-informed meeting protocols as well as inclusive meeting protocols and expectations

Convene stakeholder meeting of first responders with some community representation to discuss findings around our capacity to curtail violent extremism in partnership with the community

Develop bystander trainings in partnership with community members, including content on risk factors and behavioral changes and a list of services to make referrals.

Conduct community-specific bystander training with trusted messengers/trained partners for members of the community
